## CAMPOUT GUIDE AND EQUIPMENT LIST, INCLUDING WINTER CAMPING

### 1. Activity Planning

- 2018 Timberline District Klondike – February 23 – February 25, 2018 at Tahosa Scout Ranch.
- Scout or Scouts-in-Charge.
- Adult Helpers / Drivers – Make sure you have enough and get commitments.
- Sign-up Sheet.
- Does transportation need to be arranged? Is the trailer ready to go?
- Do we need a tour permit? Not anymore as of April 1, 2017 due to rule changes at the national office level.
- Medical Forms / Permission Slips, including adults. These are the Parts A and B of the National Health Form.
- How many are going? Youth and Adults. Are any non-Troop guests going on the event? If yes, we need Part A and B forms for them also.
- Equipment Needs. Special equipment needs for winter camping?
- What is the expected Weather?
- What time of year is it?
- Communication – Does everybody know what's happening?
- How much will it cost?
- Should you collect any money in advance for fees and/or the food?
- Menu planning. Take the event and the expected weather into consideration.
- For Winter Camping, keep it simpler, choose pre-prepared foods that can be boiled, pre-cook certain meats, use the coolers to keep food from freezing.
- Plan for extra calories to be burned by people in the winter and bring high energy foods.
- Shopping.
- Communication – Does everybody know what's happening?
- Should you bring your Class A's? (Figure the answer to this is always Yes, unless told otherwise.)
- Are there any service opportunities that we can do?
- Are there any Merit Badges that can be worked on as part of the event?
- Are there any Rank Advancement requirements that can be done?
- Should we plan for a Scout's Own Service as part of the activity?
- Communication – Does everybody know what's happening?

### 2. Now we're getting ready to leave.

- Medical Forms / Permission Slips – remember these are Parts A and B. (Scout medications are given to the lead Adult Helper. Scouts can keep inhalers and Epi pins, but these and all medications must be noted on the Part A medical form.
- Troop and American Flags. Troop banner.

- Personal Equipment – See Personal Equipment List (Put Scout's name / phone number on important items and/or stuff you want back).
- Troop Equipment – base it on the number of people going, with extra just in case:
  - i. Water. At least one gallon per person. Will there be water available at the camp location or do we have to take everything we need? How much water do we need for cooking?
  - ii. Food / Beverages.
  - iii. Coolers. Consider whether or not you need to take ice. In winter, the coolers may be used to keep certain foods from freezing. Don't expect that certain foods, like meat, will defrost itself by the time you need it so plan accordingly.
  - iv. Troop First Aid Kit (sufficiently stocked and up to date).
  - v. Stoves.
  - vi. Propane bottles, including "Y" connectors (Make sure the bottles are full).
  - vii. Cooking equipment and cooking gear.
  - viii. Extra pots especially for winter camping and whatever else you might need for cooking based on the selected menu. Winter camping tip – dump the water from the jugs into pans before the water freezes in the jugs. Water jugs should be buried in snow to help keep the water from freezing too solidly.
  - ix. Lanterns / Lantern poles. Check the lanterns to make sure the glass globes are not broken and that there are mantles.
  - x. Rope.
  - xi. Tarps and/or Troop Awning.
  - xii. Tents – bring at least 3 extra tents. Make sure they are complete – tent, rain fly, poles that work, stakes, ropes, etc.
  - xiii. Fire wood – for winter camping, bring extra firewood for morning camp fires also.
  - xiv. Charcoal / Lighter Fluid.
  - xv. Dutch Ovens / Charcoal chimney / Fire pans.
  - xvi. Griddles / Grills.
  - xvii. Troop Sled and snow shovels.
  - xviii. Fire extinguishers.
- Does everybody have what they need?
- Does everybody know where they are going?
- Count who is going.
- Everyone gets a number that they keep for the entire event so that we can keep track of everybody.
- Circle up before you leave for a blessing and final instructions.

### **3. On the road**

- Act like Scouts. Behave, act and speak appropriately.
- Do a count and make sure everyone is accounted for.
- Clean up any messes.

### **4. Now we're there.**

- Do a count and make sure everyone is accounted for.
- Unload equipment. Everyone helps.
- Set up a Scout like Camp with everything in its place. Everyone helps.
- Don't leave items lying around that could be quickly covered up by snow and lost.
- Make sure the camp is safe and that all equipment is properly set up.
- Store unused equipment and/or food appropriately.
- For Winter Camping, fill pots with water before the water freezes in the jugs.
- Once stoves, lanterns, etc. are properly connected and tested, OK to leave the valves open on the propane bottles in cold weather to keep them from freezing, but make sure that all knobs are turned to OFF when not in use.
- Set up a duty roster. Make sure it is fair and that everyone is included.

- Make sure everyone knows the plan for the activity. Keep people informed.
- Act like Scouts. Behave, act and speak appropriately.
- Clean up any messes as they happen. Makes things easier for everyone.
- Follow the Buddy System. Make sure everyone is accounted for at all times.
- FOLLOW SAFETY RULES.
- **NO FLAMES IN TENTS. EVER. NO EXCEPTIONS.** INCLUDES COLEMAN LANTERNS.
- FOLLOW THE "BUDDY SYSTEM"

#### 5. After the activity

- Do a count and make sure everyone is accounted for.
- Clean up and put away equipment. Everyone helps.
- Make sure everything is ready for the next activity.
- Make sure tents are dried and properly stored.
- Take care of personal equipment and make sure it's ready for the next activity.
- Give a verbal report at the next meeting about the activity.
- Figure out how much money people might owe and collect it.
- Reflect on the activity. Did everyone have fun? Was it worth it? Would you do it again?

#### **WINTER CAMPING – PERSONAL EQUIPMENT LIST:**

- **A POSITIVE MENTAL ATTITUDE. If you think you are going to get cold and have a miserable time, you probably will. If you think you are going to have fun and learn some "cool" things (pun intended) about cold weather camping and having fun regardless of the weather, you definitely will.**
- **NO COTTON! (Except for fleece type items and cotton / poly blends which are designed for cold weather. Jeans and 100% cotton shirts, sweatshirts and socks are the worst for cold weather. Once they get wet they don't dry.)**
- Daypack for your "10 Essentials Plus" Items, which are:
  - Scout Handbook, Pen and small pad.
  - Personal First Aid Kit (sufficiently stocked and up to date).
  - 2 pair of warm mittens / gloves, preferably at least one pair that is wool, and "wristlets" if you have them. Wristlets help keep the back of the hand warmer and thus help keep the blood in your hands warmer.
  - 2 winter hats, at least one that is wool. Your head is a big radiator.
  - Cap / visor.
  - Work gloves.
  - Emergency blanket.
  - Flashlight and extra batteries, plus a backup flashlight.
  - Sunglasses / ski goggles. Be wary of snow blindness.
  - Sunscreen / lip balm
  - 2 water bottles / canteens – Wide mouth Nalgene's work better to keep the opening from freezing.
  - Personal hygiene kit.
  - Large garbage bag. Becomes a personal shelter when needed.
  - Compass (one that works).
  - Plastic whistle and reflective mirror.
  - Pocket Knife (with Totin' Chip).
  - Weatherproof matches / lighter (with Fireman's Chit).
  - Extra pair of warm socks (socks double as mittens also when needed).
- **NO COTTON!**
- Backpack and/or Equipment Bag.
- Scout Uniform (Wear it for the trip to the event unless told otherwise).

- ❑ 2 pair warm wool pants (NO JEANS OR COTTON PANTS). Ski type nylon pants or overalls are good at keeping you dry, but they also seal in water and sweat on the inside so be careful.
- ❑ 3 pair wool / winter blend socks (at least) (NO COTTON SOCKS) – One pair of socks to be kept in your Daypack as one of your "10 Essentials Plus". Change into dry socks when getting into bed. Keeps your feet warmer and then you are ready to go in the morning.
- ❑ 2 pair warm boots (one Sorrel-type). Leather can get wet and freeze, so be careful relying on leather. If you bring leather boots (not recommended) make sure you have a warm back-up pair.
- ❑ Long underwear (NO COTTON) Tops and Pants – Several thin layers are better than one thick layer.
- ❑ **DID WE MENTION NO COTTON?**
- ❑ Underwear – Nylon or wicking type underwear works better than cotton.
- ❑ Fleece Jackets / Warm Wool Sweaters.
- ❑ Heavy Winter Jacket, preferably hooded, with a zipper that works.
- ❑ Sleeping bag (with appropriate rating for the event). Before you go, make sure the zipper works and roll your sleeping clothes, dry socks, a hat and light gloves into your sleeping bag and then they are there when you need them.
- ❑ Flannel sleeping bag liner, wool blanket or 2nd bag.
- ❑ Sleeping pad or cot. Air gets cold so sometimes air filled mattresses are colder than a regular pad.
- ❑ Small Pillow.
- ❑ Ground cloth or tarp.
- ❑ Tent – 3 or 4 Season. The Troop tents are 3 Season tents. (w/ poles and stakes or snow anchors – old ski poles work good in deep snow).
- ❑ Plastic bowl, cup, plate and utensils (spoon, fork, knife and/or spork). Insulated beverage cup. Plastic is better in winter. Picture your tongue stuck to a metal pole.
- ❑ Small towel / hand wipes.
- ❑ Plastic bags (to store wet gear).
- ❑ **OPTIONAL**
- ❑ Personal Medications – Scouts must turn over medications to the lead Adult Helper. Only inhalers and Epi pins are allowed to be kept by a Scout, but the lead Adult Helper must be made aware.
- ❑ Camp Chair (Optional for Scouts, Mandatory for Adults ☺)
- ❑ Balaclava Hat / Face Guard.
- ❑ Gaiters.
- ❑ Hiking Poles.
- ❑ Snowshoes / Cross Country Skis.
- ❑ Extra Hat, Gloves, Socks.
- ❑ Camp Shoes.
- ❑ Reading Material.
- ❑ Candle lantern / emergency candles.
- ❑ And, don't forget that **POSITIVE MENTAL ATTITUDE.**

**Final thought, a Scout is thrifty and thus it may seem excessive to pack all or most all of the items on the above lists, but consider whether it is better to have it and not need it, or need it and not have it, especially when camping in cold weather. So the Scouts should work together with their Troop / Patrol members and share the load.**

**LAST REMINDERS – “NO COTTON”, “BUDDY SYSTEM”, “HAVE FUN!”**



**SCOUT EVENT PLANNER DUTIES FOR ACTIVITIES AND TRIPS**  
**GENERAL NOTES FOR ALL SCOUTS ATTENDING THE ACTIVITY OR TRIP**
